

Disability in Australia's aid program

New budget measure—Disability: Fair development accessible to all

Australia will provide \$30.2 million over four years, beginning 2010–11, in the new budget measure 'Disability: Fair development accessible to all'. This new budget measure funds the implementation of the disability-specific outcomes outlined in the Government's strategy <u>Development for All: Towards a disability-inclusive Australian aid program 2009-2014</u> which was launched in November 2008.

Development for All is designed to change the way that Australian international development assistance is designed and delivered to ensure that people with disability are included throughout and benefit equally with others. This new focus and investment responds to the fact that people with disability are the world's largest and most disadvantaged minority, accounting for up to 20 per cent of the poor in developing countries¹. Of the estimated 650 million people with disability (over 10 per cent of the global population), about 80 per cent live in developing countries², and as such the Millennium Development Goals cannot be achieved unless they are included in development efforts.

People with disability are entitled to the same rights as all others. Australia formally recognised this by ratifying the


